

#### MUSINGS FROM PASTOR DAN

The following was written by speaker and author Joshua Harris and is in his book "I Kissed Dating Goodbye." Joshua says it was something that he put on paper as the result of a dream he had while in Puerto Rico for the 1995 Billy Graham Crusade and published in his magazine the same year. It is very good and worth serious introspection upon completion.

#### THE ROOM

In that place between wakefulness and dreams, I found myself in the room. There were no distinguishing features except for the one wall covered with small index card files.

They were like the ones in libraries that list titles by author or subject in alphabetical order. But these files, which stretched from floor to ceiling and



seemingly endless in either direction, had very different headings. As I drew near the wall of files, the first to catch my attention was one that read "Girls I have liked." I opened it and began flipping through the cards. I quickly shut it, shocked to realize that I recognized the names written on each one. And then without being told, I knew exactly where I was.

This lifeless room with its small files was a crude catalog system for my life. Here were written the actions of my every moment, big and small, in a detail my memory couldn't match. A sense of wonder and curiosity, coupled with horror, stirred within me as I began randomly opening files and exploring their content. Some brought joy and sweet memories; others a sense of shame and regret so intense that I would look over my shoulder to see if anyone was watching.

A file named "Friends" was next to one marked "Friends I have betrayed." The titles ranged from the mundane to the outright weird "Books I Have Read," "Lies I Have Told," "Comfort I have Given," "Jokes I Have Laughed at."

Some were almost hilarious in their exactness: "Things I've yelled at my brothers." Others I couldn't laugh at: "Things I Have Done in My Anger", "Things I Have Muttered Under My Breath at My Parents." I never ceased to be surprised by the contents.

Often there were many more cards than I expected. Sometimes fewer than I hoped. I was overwhelmed by the sheer volume

of the life I had lived. Could it be possible that I had the time in my years to fill each of these thousands or even millions of cards? But each card confirmed this truth. Each was written in my own handwriting. Each signed with my signature.

When I pulled out the file marked "TV Shows I have watched", I realized the files grew to contain their contents. The cards were packed tightly, and yet after two or three yards, I hadn't found the end of the file. I shut it, shamed, not so much by the quality of shows but more by the vast time I knew that file represented.

When I came to a file marked "Lustful Thoughts," I felt a chill run through my body. I pulled the file out only an inch, not willing to test its size and drew out a card. I shuddered at its detailed content. I felt sick to think that such a moment had been recorded.

An almost animal rage broke on me. One thought dominated my mind: No one must ever see these cards! No one

must ever see this room! I have to destroy them!" In insane frenzy I yanked the file out. Its size didn't matter now. I had to



empty it and burn the cards. But as I took it at one end and began pounding it on the floor, I could not dislodge a single card. I became desperate and pulled out a card, only to find it as strong as steel when I tried to tear it.

Defeated and utterly helpless, I returned the file to its slot. Leaning my forehead against the wall, I let out a long, self-pitying sigh. And then I saw it. The title bore "People I Have Shared the Gospel With." The handle was brighter than those around it, newer, almost unused. I pulled on its handle and a small box not more than three inches long fell into my hands. I could count the cards it contained on one hand.

And then the tears came. I began to

weep. Sobs so deep that they hurt. They started in my stomach and shook through me. I fell on my knees and cried. I cried out of shame, from the overwhelming shame of it all. The rows of file shelves swirled in my tear-filled eyes. No one must ever, ever know of this room. I must lock it up and hide the key.

But then as I pushed away the tears, I saw Him. No, please not Him. Not here. Oh, anyone but Jesus. I watched helplessly as He began to open the files and read the cards. I couldn't bear to watch His response. And in the moments I could bring myself to look at His face, I saw a sorrow deeper than my own.

He seemed to intuitively go to the worst boxes. Why did He have to read every one? Finally, He turned and looked at me from across the room. He looked at me with pity in His eyes. But this was a pity that didn't anger me. I dropped my head, covered my face with my hands and began to cry again. He walked over and put His arm around me. He could have said so many things. But He didn't say a word. He just cried with me.

Then He got up and walked back to the wall of files. Starting at one end of the room, He took out a file and, one by one, began to sign His name over mine on each card. "No!" I shouted rushing to Him. All I could find to say was "No, no," as I pulled the card from Him. His name shouldn't be on these cards. But there it was, written in red so rich, so dark, so alive. The name of Jesus covered mine. It was written with His blood. He gently took the card back. He smiled a sad smile and began to sign the cards.

I don't think I'll ever understand how He did it so quickly, but the next instant it seemed I heard Him close the last file and walk back to my side.. He placed His hand on my shoulder and said, "It is finished." I stood up, and He led me out of the room. There was no lock on its door. There were still cards to be written.

### FINANCE COMMITTEE Bill Brooks, Chairperson

race Church continues to be in a strong financial position. The operating account netted almost \$13,000 in receipts over disbursements in 2018 due to very generous year end gifts of three of our members.

Our capital budget broke even in 2018 with one very generous member contributing to this fund regularly. We also netted a positive \$5,800 in our rental account from 503 Race Street.

We have 122 giving units and the breakdown of the contributions are as follow for 2018:

- ◆ 6 giving units gave \$75,000 during the year. (\$6,500 and above)
- ◆ 16 giving units gave \$76,000 during the year (\$3,500 to \$6,500)
- ◆ 100 giving units gave \$80,000 during the year (less than \$3,500)

This is very enlightening information. It is alarming to think that only 6 giving units contribute one third of our budget and 22 giving units contribute two thirds. What will happen if these 22 giving units are no longer able to do so.

Even though our budget closed strong in 2018, consider where you are with your giving and pray about where God wants you to be. After all, everything we have belongs to God. Let's use His gifts wisely to keep Grace Church functioning to be a beacon of light in Cambridge and the surrounding community.

We had one young boy who asked to say grace on Sunday nights. What a joy he was. His Mom, he and his older brother found a place to rent in February. While I was glad for them, I have missed him.

Once again the local Girl Scout troops donated cookies to our backpack program. The troops sell boxes to send overseas and to give to a local project. When troops have a cookie booth you will see where you can buy a box of cookies to be donated. We have been lucky to be chosen as one of the local groups to receive cookies. We got 7 cases to be divided up in the backpacks for the next few weeks.

I hope everyone got to see the bulletin board in the hallway. We had some pictures posted of folks doing mission work and some thank you notes from the children at Sandy Hill and Choptank Elementary Schools.

I can't thank everyone enough who helps keep Missions going by donating on the first Sunday of the month. We helped a single Mom in January with her rent and another lady in February to keep her heat on. We have also helped several families with food in February... all because of your generous donations and prayers!

It is April already, the time has "sprung forward," and Spring has officially arrived. Time does seem to fly by quickly when we stay busy. As trustees, I believe, it's a given that there will always be something to do to keep us busy.

We have been busy investigating the leaking issue next door at 503 Race. Brandyn Spear has been contacted, scheduled, and has done some investigative work on the roof of 503 Race. It was found that the "scuppers" that allow the water to drain from the flat roof were totally clogged with dirt and debris. Now that the drainage system is clear and working properly we will continue to monitor the moisture issues inside.

Also, at 503 Race, I have contacted and met with a representative from Salisbury Door and Hardware regarding the handicap entrance door. Rust has taken its toll in some of the steel framing which is requiring some replacement and updating. We should have some estimates to review in a few weeks.

For several years, the large circular stained-glass window

above the choir loft has been dimly lit. Well, that has finally come to an end. Early in February, Ronnie Coulbourne was contracted to remedy that situation. There is now up-to-date LED up-lighting behind the glass that beautifully highlights the image of Jesus. Our thanks to the "WinGS" group for offering to take care of the financial part of this project. Also, thanks to Ronnie and his men for a job well done.

Recently, some of the Baraca leaders approached me with a request to upgrade their microphone system to wireless which would eliminate having microphone cords laying on the floor which creates a trip hazard. That request has been fulfilled and a new 4 mic system has been installed. This new equipment was funded fully by the Baraca class. Many thanks to the class.

Lastly, we are working with our choir director to fulfill her need for a computer to help her organize and create a digital library of the choir's music, past, present and future.

I look forward to seeing you on Easter morning at 9:45 a.m. for our celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!


## MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE Beverly Mullikin, Chairperson
